The West Virginia Children's Trust Fund raises money for innovative community programs and services that help children grow up free from abuse and neglect.

In 2012, the Trust Fund provided more than **\$512,000** to support local child abuse prevention efforts in communities around the state. The Trust Fund supported the work of forty local Partners in Prevention teams, and 22 additional community grants ranging from \$1,000 to \$25,000.



Your support for these programs means:

- More than **43,000** West Virginia parents, children, professionals and community members received face-to-face support or training.
- More than **123,000** educational materials made it into the hands of parents, professionals and the public.
- During the past 5 years, fewer children are being abused in West Virginia.*

You really do make a difference

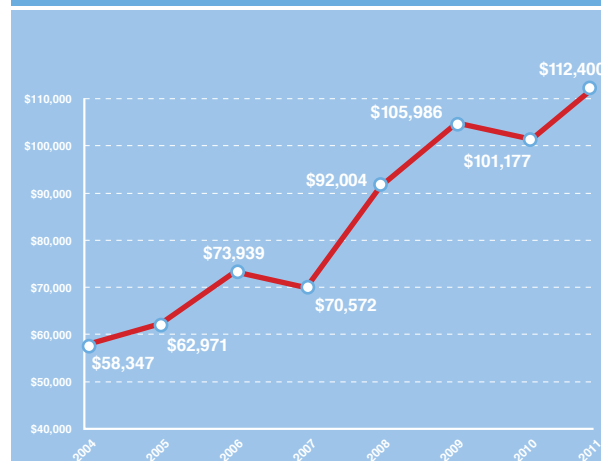

The Trust Fund has built a network of Partners in Prevention—community groups that offer events, educational opportunities and help for families. For example:

- Support and information for parents through parent support groups, parenting classes, parent/child playgroups, and fatherhood initiatives.
- Outreach and education through after-school programs, bullying prevention, Internet safety, character development, and teen empowerment programs.

- Concrete support to parents through family resource centers, parenting fairs, educational community baby showers, and baby pantries.
- Trainings and workshops, such as the state Leadership Institute on Preventing Child Abuse & Neglect, Stewards of Children child sexual abuse prevention program, and implementation of Our Babies: Safe & Sound education campaign to promote safe sleeping and prevent Shaken Baby Syndrome.
